In direct quotations, commas introduce or interrupt the quoted speech, enhancing readability. For example, "He said, 'I'll be there soon.'" Without a comma, the sentence may be confusing.

In a list, commas separate items to clarify that each is distinct. For example, "I need to buy apples, oranges, and bananas."

In a sentence with coordinate adjectives, commas separate adjectives of equal rank that independently describe the noun. For example, "It was a long, hot summer."
