Why is personification a powerful tool in poetry? Provide an example to support your explanation.

Personification is a powerful tool in poetry because it allows poets to create emotional connections by attributively human characteristics to inanimate objects or abstract concepts. For example, in William Wordsworth's poem "I Wander'd Lonely as a Cloud," the daffodils are described as "flutter[ring] and danc[ing] in the breeze," which brings them to life and evokes a sense of joy and movement.
